APPROVAL OF MINUTES – March 16, 2018

Mr. Owen moved and Ms. Robles seconded the motion to approve the March 16, 2018 ONCC meeting minutes. The members approved the minutes by unanimous voice vote.

Report of the City of Chicago Department of Aviation

1) February 2018 Airport Noise Management System Report

CDA consultant Jeffrey Jackson, Landrum & Brown, presented the February 2018 ANMS report. He said that Runway 28R was the most used departure runway at 52 percent; Runway 27L—the most used arrival runway at 37 percent in February 2018. Complaints (all hours) totaled 33,499 from 4,867 residents. Of the 33,499 residents, 966 complainants registered complaints during the nighttime hours.

The total operations at O'Hare during February 2018 were 2,173 as reported by the FAA's Air Traffic Data System.

Mayor Pulice asked why the complaints were significantly lower.

Mr. Jackson said CAPTCHA feature was implemented. The feature asked complainants to check a series of boxes.

Mr. Evans said a footnote should be added to the report stating the CAPTCHA had been implemented.

Ms. Dunlap asked if there was any difference with the number of complaints from the internet varied from phone complaints since the implementation of CAPTCHA.

Mr. Jackson replied there was very little difference.

2) Residential Sound Insulation Program Update

Mr. Frame reported testing on the defective windows continued. Residents experiencing issues could call 773-894-3636 to request a visit by an inspector.

3) O'Hare 21 Terminal Redevelopment – Overview

Commissioner Evans gave an overview of the approved O'Hare 21 Terminal Development plan. The \$8.5 billion plan was approved by the Chicago City Council and agreed to by United, American, Delta and Spirit airlines. The plan is the largest capital expansion in the airport's history and will be developed over the next eight years. The plan creates 25 percent more gate capacity at the airport, which had not added a new gate in 24 years. The Terminal Area Plan (TAP) replaces aging infrastructure, includes redevelopment of existing terminals, new gates and facilities at Terminal 5, the redevelopment of Terminal 2 into a fully integrated O'Hare Global Terminal to serve international and domestic passengers and renovations and expanded concourses to Terminals 1 and 3. The projected economic impact to the nine-county region is \$65 billion by 2026 and an increase of 75,000 FTEs. The Commissioner commended the ONCC on the IFQ plan and the work the Commission did to develop the plan. She said that such a plan was unparalleled and that the aviation community worldwide was talking about it.

Mayor Juracek said additional gates would reduce delays which could lead to flights being pushed into shoulder hours.

Mr. Evans congratulated Commissioner Evans on the O'Hare 21 Terminal Redevelopment Plan. He said his community accepted aircraft noise with the economic benefits that Western Access would bring. He asked why Western Access wasn't addressed as part of the plan.

Commissioner Evans said the Western Access plan was flawed. O'Hare 21 gives the opportunity to move forward and the funds that would be needed to make it happen in the future.

Ms. Dunlap noted the forecasted number of operations were lower than expected and wondered how much more cargo was there versus passenger operations.

Commissioner Evans said cargo was a low percent of operations at O'Hare compared to passenger.

Commissioner Evans acknowledged the importance of ONCC and its partnership with the community.

Report of the ONCC Chair – Mayor Arlene A. Juracek

1) ONCC Panel Discussion on Departures—May 4, 2018

Mayor Juracek reported that the May 4 ONCC General Meeting would feature a panel of aviation experts to discuss daytime departures. FAA Great Lakes Regional Administrator Rebecca MacPherson and her team were in the process of refining all the submitted questions to five pertinent categories. The panel, which would include a representative from the FAA, a United Airlines and American Airline pilot, O'Hare control tower management and the CDA would cover the daytime departure procedures.

2) Boeing Presentation at ONCC – June 1, 2018

Mayor Juracek reported a representative from Boeing would be presenting airframe information to the ONCC on June 1, 2018.

Report of the ONCC Standing Committee

1) ONCC Residential Committee Report – Mr. Ralph Sorce, Vice Chair

Committee Vice Chair Sorce reported on Phase 17, Construction for Bid Package 1 was complete for 304 of 306 homes. The remaining two homes would be complete in the next few weeks. Construction for Bid Package 2 was complete for all 308 homes. Bid Package 3 included 131 historic homes. The specifications were being developed by the City Departments of Aviation, Law, and Procurement Services. Once all three departments approved the specifications, the City would advertise this construction contract opportunity.

For Phase 18, there were a total of 530 homes eligible. The CDA was finalizing the selection of an architectural firm for the design work.

The next Residential Committee meeting would take place on Wednesday, May 16, 2018, at the Norridge Village Hall at 9:30 A.M.

2) ONCC Ad Hoc Nominating Committee Report – Mayor Jeffrey Sherwin, Chair

Mayor Sherwin reported the Ad Hoc Nominating Committee would meet on April 18th to review, discuss and nominate recommended candidates for the 2018 ONCC slate of officers. He reported that he received no nominations from ONCC members. The current ONCC officers had expressed an interest in continuing to participate in their current leadership roles.
